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Still Standing On Business: Nyeri County's Legal Framework

In our previous article we focused on the general legal atmosphere that is part of Kenya's jurisprudence when it comes to setting, up, operating and compliance re one's enterprise. We highlighted the key elements in launching a business include developing the business idea, conducting market research on your product or service, and writing an all-inclusive business plan.

The piece also focused on various areas of Business Law a lawyer can assist with in order to get your enterprise up to a strong start. From Contract Law to the Privacy Act; from Intellectual Property Law to Employment and Labour Law the legal factors affecting businesses can read like a shopping list of law terms. It is important to make sure your business meets legal requirements, which will not only help it grow but also protect it against costly errors. In this feature we now focus specifically on Nyeri County's laws and

ordinances as pertain to Nyeri's business community: Nyeri County Laws: The Nyeri County Revenue Administration Act, 2014 as read with the Nyeri County Finance Act, is perhaps the most essential piece of legislation in the County Government of Nyeri. The Constitution of Kenya, 2010, Articles 185 and 209 provide that the County Assembly as an organ with legislative authority to make laws within the County Government with Article 209 providing for the powers to impose taxes and charges. Article 209 of

the Constitution of Kenya, 2010 applies in your business in the form of license fees, permits, land rates, cess, advertisements payments, hiring of equipment charges amongst other revenue generating mechanisms that the County is mandated to use. As a business person, it is useful to familiarize yourself with the provisions of these two laws since they govern not only the payments such as the nature of the licenses you are required to obtain to operate within the County but also enforcement measures that

the County Government may use to recover unpaid amounts or where there is non-compliance. For instance, section 12B of the Nyeri County Revenue Administration Act, 2014 empowers the enforcing officer to impound your goods where there is non-compliance. Impounding of goods not only comes with disruptions to your business but also with additional costs such as fines and towing costs levied to your business.

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It is, therefore, your obligation to read, understand, and seek interpretation from the County Government or your lawyer where you do not understand the provisions of these two laws. One of the other laws that as a business person that you should consider reading, depending on the nature of your business is the Nyeri County Alcoholic Drinks Control Act, 2024 (Act No. 4 of 2024), and the attendant regulations, if you desire to venture or are in the business of selling frothy waters to the general public.



The new law provides for licensing, as well as avenues to resolve disputes arising out of the process of issuance of licenses. For instance, the law provides for dispute resolution before filing a dispute to the High Court, which may save your business time, and litigation costs. For aspiring business persons, the County Government of Nyeri has ensured that you can have access to capital for your business at affordable rates.

The Nyeri County Enterprise Development Fund Act, 2015 under section 4 provides that it is established to provide access to

financing facilities including capital to micro and small enterprise businesses whilst also ensuring that entrepreneurs are able to develop linkages with large enterprises, provide training and mentorship to micro and small enterprise businesses as well as facilitate technology acquisition by these businesses.

Another law that is closely related to stimulating the business environment within our county is the Nyeri County Investment and Development Corporation Act, 2016, which provides for an investment vehicle for both the public and the County Government

through the County Investments and Development Corporation.

The public may invest in the said Corporation as and when the County Government floats the shares for purchase to the public. The Physical and Land Use Planning Act, 2019 is also an important law to the planning of our County.

The law provides for construction permits, and the powers of enforcers. It is prudent for those planning to build to familiarize themselves with the mandate, and functions of the County Government to avoid incurring penalties.

The law also guides businesses on the locations they can and cannot operate from. The law further provides for punishment through fines and imprisonment.

The County Government of Nyeri has further identified inefficiencies in the current legal framework, and is in the process of legislating the Tariffs and Pricing Policy, the County Rating Act, the Trade Licensing Act, the Nyeri County Physical and Planning Bill, as well as the Cess Bill. These laws will ensure that the County Government provides comprehensive laws on various issues surrounding the

business environment while also ensuring transparency, and predictability of the legal environment.

Revenue raising measures are important to ensure that the County Government of Nyeri provides essential services such as road, Early Child Development Education (ECDE) and other mandated functions of the County through the Constitution of Kenya, 2010.

The County Government of Nyeri ensures that you are actively involved in the legislative making process through public participation. Other than payment of fees and taxes payable, you need to make it a duty to attend public participations to ensure your voice counts in the legislative making process.

Therefore, incorporating a well thought out, deliberate and tactical approach to legal planning offers significant advantages. This MO goes beyond mere compliance, to converting legal considerations into a source of value and competitive advantage. Understanding these aspects go a long way in turning challenges into opportunities, and spurring long-term success.

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Nyeri County Moves to Develop Land Policy

The County Government of Nyeri took a bold, significant step toward transforming land in governance by hosting a three-day workshop in partnership with the European Union (EU) and the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) funded by the Digital Governance Land Programme (DGLP). The workshop which was officially closed by Lands CECM Ndirangu Gachunia, brought together land experts, and key stakeholders to develop Nyeri's first-ever County Land Policy, a landmark framework to guide the use, management, and protection of land while promoting sustainable development for future generations. While addressing stakeholders, the CECM emphasized the crucial role of sustainable land management in

promoting both economic growth and environmental stewardship.

He commended the formulation of a comprehensive land policy aimed at enhancing community engagement, ensuring equitable land distribution, and conserving natural resources. The policy also seeks to strengthen land tenure security, encourage investment in agricultural innovation, and ensure compliance with environmental regulations to build resilience against climate change.

Sessional Paper No.3 of 2009 whose shelf-life has since expired is under review by the National Government.

As the Department awaits the completion of the process, Nyeri like many counties across Kenya, is continuing grappling with land-related challenges that are hindering development and strained social harmony, and this can't wait for the National Government to

guide.

The County must rise to the occasion and guide our people in this direction.

The National Government can as well borrow a leaf from us.

From irregular allocation and grabbing of public land, ownership disputes stemming from poor documentation, succession conflicts, and rampant land fragmentation have long undermined economic progress and public confidence in land administration.

The ongoing writeshop aims to close these gaps by translating national land laws into practical, county-specific solutions that respond to Nyeri's unique realities.

Currently, many land processes in the county remain manual, making record management inefficient and prone to loss or manipulation.

The uncontrolled subdivision of land into uneconomical plots has reduced agri-

cultural productivity, while the absence of proper valuation systems has opened doors for speculation and inflated land prices.

Moreover, unregistered ownership, including informal settlements, colonial villages, and unregularized market plots, continues to leave many residents vulnerable and excluded from formal land rights.

Through this policy, Nyeri County aims to chart a new course toward transparent, equitable, and sustainable land governance.

Its main objectives are to resolve land use conflicts by streamlining administration services, establish a framework for effective land use management, and simplify processes to make them faster and more accessible to the public.

The discussions during the write shop are anchored on four key thematic areas:

- Land administration & Management.

- Land Use Planning,
- Transport, Infrastructure, Health and Education, and

- Agriculture, Environment, Natural Resources, and Conservation.

By addressing these interconnected sectors, the policy will ensure that land serves not only as an economic asset but also as a foundation for social development and environmental sustainability.

As the session concluded, optimism ran high among participants that the policy would transform land administration into a driver of growth, security, and dignity for all Nyerians.

The workshop convened key stakeholders such as FAO Cluster Coordinator Jattan Wako, Lands Chief Officer Fredrick Maina, county directors, surveyors, planners, and other sector specialists.



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Sports Merchandise Distribution at Chinga Ward, Othaya



The Department of Gender, Youth, Sports and Social Services led by CECM Esther Ndung'u, joined by the Deputy Governor Nyeri H.E David Kinaniri and the MCA for Chinga Ward, Hon. KISIP 2 Team Concludes the First Phase of E&S Monitoring Exercise

The Kenya Informal Settlements Improvement Project (KISIP 2), implemented in partnership with the World Bank, has successfully concluded the first phase of its comprehensive Environmental and Social (E&S) Monitoring and Evaluation exercise. Led by National Project Coordinating Team (NPCT) representative Peter Bundi, and guided by County Project Environmental Safeguards Officer Kennedy Kanoga, the team carried out a targeted Social Safeguards site spot-check across four informal settlements: Kiamwathi and Chorong'i in Ruring'u Ward, Mweiga in Mweiga Ward (Kieni West Sub-county), and Ihwagi in Iria-ini Ward (Mathira East Sub-county). The exercise was undertaken in alignment with Objective No. 4 of the



Project's Occupational Health and Safety (OHS) Enhancement Plan, which emphasizes fostering a strong culture of incident prevention. It assessed compliance levels among supervision teams, consulting firms, and contractors, benchmarking their work against the World Bank's Environmental and Social Standards (ESS) and Kenya's own rigorous E&S policies and regulations. "The primary goal of these periodic spot-checks is to ensure that as we transform communities through improved infrastructure, we do so safely, sustainably, and in full partnership with the residents," noted Bundi. The national team expressed strong satisfaction with the commitment demonstrated by county officials, consultants, and contractors, highlighting the positive synergy between national oversight and local implementation. These monitoring exercises will continue periodically to ensure that E&S excellence remains a cornerstone of the KISIP 2 Project and that full compliance is consistently upheld across all operations. Earlier, the team had paid a courtesy call to Lands Chief Officer Fredrick Maina and County Project Coordinator Beatrice Koeach. The overall findings of the monitoring exercise commended the impressive progress and adherence to standards observed in infrastructure upgrading works across all participating counties.

Nyeri Shines at the 8th International EMS & Fire Symposium

Nyeri County shined at the 8th International EMS & Fire Symposium and Competition. Nyeri County emerged third overall in the fire and

rescue competition at the 8th International Emergency Medical Services (EMS) and Fire Symposium and Competition held at the Bandari Maritime Academy, Mombasa. The County finished behind Nairobi and Makueni, with six counties competing after a week of intensive

training and collaboration. Nyeri's delegation participated through the Department of Gender, Youth, Sports, and Social Services, represented by officers from the Disaster Management Directorate under the leadership of Director Col. (Rtd) Lucas Teimuge, MBS, NDC, PSC (K).

The event brought together over 500 delegates, 30 County Governments, and teams from Uganda, Malawi, the United States, the Kenya Ports Authority, and the wider emergency services fraternity. Throughout the five-day event, participants engaged in technical sessions, simulations, and specialized training programs covering fire safety and prevention, leadership in emergency services, tactical response, water rescue, EVOC, and HazMat operations. Hazardous Materials (HazMat): Offering both theoretical and hands-on training in identifying hazardous materials, understanding their health effects, and applying containment and vapor suppression techniques—guided by the Emergency Response Guidebook (ERG). Overall, the symposium

and its accompanying training sessions strengthened participants' leadership, technical expertise, and teamwork, while reinforcing the values of safety, communication, and collaboration. These sessions enhanced skills, strengthened teamwork, and promoted improved coordination in emergency response efforts. The closing ceremony was graced by the Deputy Governor of Lamu County, the CECM from Makueni County, and County Directors from Nyeri and Makueni. Nyeri County reaffirms its commitment to strengthening disaster management and emergency preparedness under the leadership of H.E. Governor Dr. Mutahi Kahiga, ensuring the safety and well-being of all residents.

Nyeri County Public Health Surveillance Review Meeting

The Department of Medical Services and Public Health convened a critical Public Health Surveillance Review Meeting led by the Director of Medical Services, Dr. Nelson Muriu. Present at the meeting were the County Surveillance Coordinator, Moni-

ca Ndegwa, and the eight Sub-County Surveillance Officers. The session aimed to thoroughly review the progress of health surveillance across the county and strategically identify ways to strengthen our detection and response systems. A key highlight of the review was the resounding success of Event-Based Surveillance (EBS), which tracks un-

structured information and rumors for early warning. The EBS implementation in Kieni East Sub-County was particularly noted for raising surveillance indicators significantly. Through the dedication of trained Community Health Promoters (CHPs) and Community Disease Reporters (CDRs), and the use of the MDHARURA digital platform, the sub-county

reported a massive increase in activity, from 180 signals to 680 signals reported in the last quarter (Q1, 2025-2026). This successful system is detecting and responding to a wide range of public health threats, including:
* Animal Health Issues: Detection of livestock diseases and animal-related risks like dog bites.

* Violence & Safety: Reporting cases of Gender-Based Violence (GBV), rape, and suicides

* Environmental Threats: Identifying and responding to issues like uninspected meat and poor wastewater disposal. Dr. Muriu hailed the entire surveillance team for their hard work and assured them of his unwavering support. He emphasized that key areas require enhanced focus and action to protect our citizens:
* Maternal and Perinatal

Death Surveillance and Response (MPDSR).
* Media Reports and Rumors: Improving the system for tracking and verifying community rumors and media reports (EBS).
* Antimicrobial Resistance (AMR): Prioritizing efforts to combat AMR in our health facilities.

The Director further urged the team to develop sub-county-based help contacts. These contacts will allow community members to easily reach out or report any Community-Based Events (CBEs), thereby cementing the community's role as the first line of response in our public health surveillance system. Together, the Department is committed to building a robust and responsive public health surveillance system to protect the well-being of every resident in our county.

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Nyeri Health Facilities Receive Vital Oxygen Support Equipment

The Department of Medical Services and Public Health received a donation of Medical equipment from Amref Health Africa in Kenya. The equipment was donated under the Global Fund Covid-19 Response Mechanism - Oxygen Infrastructure Project.

During the visit, the delegation that was led by David Makama paid a courtesy call to the Chief Officer, Ibrahim Adan, and the County Director of Health Services, Dr. Nelson Muriu, who jointly received the medical equipment.

Adan expressed gratitude for the timely support, noting that the donation would significantly enhance the capacity of health facilities, particularly in expanding access to medical oxygen. Speaking during the handover, Makama thanked the County Government of Nyeri for their continued support and collaboration in Amref's programs. He assured the County of sustained support in strengthening the health systems and commended the successful operationalization of oxygen piping projects in Mweiga, Unjiru, Othaya, and Naromoru Hospitals - initiatives sponsored and completed by Amref last year.

The consignment included critical medical supplies such as patient monitors, oxygen analyzers, and wall flowmeters. Facilities set to benefit include Othaya Sub-County Hospital, Naromoru Level 4 Hospital, Consolata Hospital Mathari, Endarasha, Wamagana, Gichira, Island Farm, Kiganjo, Unjiru, and Ruguru Health Centres. County Medical Engineer, John Muriuki, conducted a sensitization session for facility representatives on the proper use and care of the equipment. He emphasized the importance of routine maintenance and timely reporting of any malfunctions. "These are costly and vital devices. Let us handle them with the utmost care and ensure any issues are promptly reported to the medical engineering team," he advised. Other officials present during the event included representatives from the beneficiary health facilities.

Impacts of HSF on Primary Health Care Facilities



The Health Services Fund (HSF) was established under the Health Services Fund Act of 2021 and plays a vital role in improving health care delivery across Nyeri. The Act provides strategic oversight for managing funds, mobilizing resources, and guiding Hospital Management Boards on user fee proposals. Health facilities authorized to collect user fees retain the larger portion, with a share allocated to support services at Dispensaries and Health Centres. Since its enactment, the

Fund has grown significantly, and its impact is visible across many facilities. Notable improvements include increased autonomy in ordering essential drugs, cost-reduction measures such as installation of solar power and drilling of boreholes, renovation works like tiling and painting, and construction of semi-permanent structures such as waiting bays for outpatient and laboratory services. The Department of Medical Services and Public Health is optimistic that the HSF will continue making even greater impacts across all facilities. As the Fund grows, the Department looks forward to improved health services, better infrastructure, and enhanced access to quality healthcare for all residents of Nyeri County.

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Nyeri County World Diabetes Day Commemoration

- Community members were also sensitized on non-communicable diseases (NCDs), the importance of early screening, healthy nutrition, and the need for Social Health Authority (SHA) registration to enhance access to healthcare services.

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In Anticipation of Level 2 Assessment - KDSP II



In anticipation of the level two assessment of the Second Kenya Devolution Support Program (KDSP II), the County Program Implementation Unit (CPIU) rolled up its sleeves in readiness for the exercise. Committed to developing a solid action plan, CPIU members met for a two-day

engagement to prepare for the upcoming level 2 assessment and review of the KDSP II work plan. If the County Government of Nyeri meets all the assessment conditions, then funds will be disbursed to the county coffers to further benefit the Nyeri citizenry. Already, in KDSP 1, the

county constructed a level IV hospital in Naromoru, which has promoted health care services in Nyeri County. The Level 2 assessment will be conducted in January - February, and the qualified county will receive a reward of 352.5 Million. On a splendid and com-

mendable note, late last month in October 2025, Nyeri County successfully met all Level 1 Minimum Conditions under the Second Kenya Devolution Support Program (KDSP II), as outlined in the program guidelines and independently verified by the Independent Verification Agent (IVA) from the State Department for Devolution. This was the second time Nyeri has qualified for a level one grant, which amounts to KSh. 37.5 Million. During the exercise, while engaging County Program Implementation Unit (CPIU) in an in-depth assessment process, the analysts carefully reviewed critical parameters, including the signing of Participation Agreements and the establishment and functionality of key institutional structures — the County Program Steering Committee (CPSC), County Pro-

gram Technical Committee (CPTC), and the CPIU, among other relevant documents. The verification team sought verifiable evidence to confirm not only the existence of these structures but also their operational effectiveness in fulfilling their mandates. They also examined key planning and financial documents, including budgets, work plans, cash flow projections, the Annual Development Plan (ADP), and the County Integrated Development Plan (CIDP), to ensure adherence to the principles of transparency, accountability, and sound financial management. Furthermore, the team confirmed that these essential documents had been duly uploaded to the official Nyeri County website, reflecting the county's commitment to openness and good governance.

DG Inspects the Construction Tetu Level IV Hospital



Nyeri Deputy Governor H.E David Kinaniri also inspected the ongoing construction of the Tetu Level IV Hospital, a project that began in May 2025. The transformation of this facility marks a major step forward in strengthening health-care infrastructure within the sub-coun-

ty. The project entails upgrading Wamagana Health Centre from a Level 3 facility to a fully-fledged Level 4 hospital with a 150-bed capacity. Once completed, the hospital will significantly enhance access to quality healthcare services for residents of Tetu and neigh-

bouring areas. This development is expected to ease the growing pressure on existing facilities and help decongest the Nyeri County Referral Hospital. The inspection was also attended by the CECM for Health, Dr. JM Kiragu.



DG Visits Mukurwe-ini Level IV Hospital

Nyeri Deputy Governor H.E David Kinaniri visited Mukurwe-ini Level IV Hospital to assess the progress of the ongoing developments within the facility. The new block under construction marks a significant milestone in improving health-care services for the people of Mukurwe-ini and beyond. The block will com-

prise two emergency theatres, a casualty department, a fully equipped medical laboratory, and a pharmacy. It will also feature consultation rooms, specialist clinics, a physiotherapy clinic, an occupational therapy clinic, a dental clinic, a dental laboratory, a plaster room, and administration offices — all designed to enhance service delivery

and ensure patients receive quality, timely, and comprehensive care. Additionally, he visited various departments where he spent time with patients and toured the wards to witness firsthand the incredible work being carried out by our dedicated healthcare teams.
